



Responsible Conduct

Our educational program focuses on educating Allied Health Professionals in the field of oncology who have an interest in learning about reproductive health communication for AYA cancer patients. This includes individuals who see a minimum of five AYA cancer patients per year. Potential applicants submit their application for consideration and then undergo competitive selection. Participants will not engage in research activities but may be viewed as subjects in research for the evaluation portion of the program. Because one of the intended benefits of participation is for learners to have opportunities to be part of research projects that may arise during discussions and planning with other members of the ECHO program, a portion of the ECHO website is devoted to the responsible conduct of research, conflict of interest, responsible authorship, policies for handling misconduct, data management, data sharing, and human and animal subjects. Links will be provided for on-line human subjects protection training, IRB policies, and current national information on these topics. Participants are guided toward learning about and adhering to the institutional guidelines and governing agencies relative to their places of employment or study.
